
Thirteenth Sunday In Ordinary Time



From the Pastors Desk: Dear Friends in Christ – I am very happy to be back in the saddle after my 6-month sabbatical. It was a long-awaited opportunity to finish some projects that had been on the shelf for years. I'll list a few below for the curious, but the most important thing I did was to remember you all at the altar every Sunday; specifically, my intention in offering the Holy Eucharist at every Sunday Mass was for the spiritual and physical well-being of all St. John's parishioners, living and dead. The Church takes this spiritual connection between a pastor and his flock so seriously that it's actually an obligation: that every Sunday one Mass is offered "pro populo", and the pastor is not excused from this even if on holiday or away from the parish. I was especially mindful of those who were suffering in any way. For the sake of my growth as a priest, and seeking to be a better disciple of Jesus Christ above all, the 30-day silent retreat was a blessed encounter with the Lord. The Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius of Loyola provided a structured daily routine of prayer and meditation, steeped in sacred scripture, focusing one's prayer on the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, and on the Blessed Mother. In terms of projects, I have researched and written a historical the archdiocese: composed article a unaccompanied setting of the Mass for a community of sisters; supplemented another setting for congregational use; researched and reconstructed an 18th-century chant I had found in a manuscript some years ago; and participated in an editorial review of the new Canadian hymnal. I enjoyed being in the classroom for a semester, teaching a practicum and auditing one of the newest courses at St. Augustine's Seminary. It was a good six months, and I am more than ready to return to the usual parish routine. Thank you all for your prayers during this time, which were surely part of God's way of drawing us all closer to him and to one another, for he is the divine weaver who makes the fabric of his Church by the mysterious ways we are woven together in prayer.
